'Signing is for everyone.'

American Sign Language classes available this spring at RichmondCC

Kathleen Rozanski is profoundly deaf. She can't hear any sounds at all. However, if she is wearing hearing aids, she can hear some noises like a car horn, a doorbell or an airplane. Hearing aids also allow her to hear music, but she can't understand any of the words being sung.

Rozanski was hired by Richmond Community College this fall to teach American Sign Language (ASL) classes.

"I always enjoyed being a teacher. I like to teach anyone to learn

about ASL. That is my passion," Rozanski wrote in an email. "Sign language is not only for deaf people. It is for everyone. Some hearing

people who are having trouble speaking can use sign language to

communicate better."

Rozanski explained that she had a student in one of her classes who was having trouble speaking due to an injury to her throat from a bad accident. Because of this, she decided to take ASL.

Rozanski is also passionate about educating hearing people about the deaf.

"Deaf people don't use the label of 'hearing impaired.' We prefer to use deaf or hard of hearing. Hearing impaired is not for deaf people," she said.

She also said most deaf people will dislike anyone asking if they can read lips.

"It is rude," Rozanski said.

When you meet deaf people, she said, you will recognize that they do not understand you or they will use sign language.

"You can try talking slowly, but if they still do not understand, then write a note instead of asking, 'Can you read lips,'" she said. "Some deaf people can read lips, but they can often misunderstand what is being said."

Born deaf, Rozanski grew up near Buffalo, N.Y. She has a sister who is hard of hearing.

"She can hear a little, but I don't hear any sound," Rozanski said.

Rozanski did not learn sign language until she was about 13 years old. At home with her fam-

ily, they used body language and came up with their own signs to communicate.

"It was not easy for me to understand language until I went to St. Mary's School for the Deaf in Buffalo. There I started to learn sign language and became better at understanding deaf culture," she said.

Rozanski went to college at Rochester Institute of Technology (RIT), where she studied photojournalism. She graduated with a Bachelor of Fine Arts. She also received a fellowship award, and she went to Europe for six months by herself.

"I learned a lot about deaf European culture. I enjoyed learning

their culture and their sign language," she said. "American Sign Language and European Sign Language are not the same. It is just like a foreign language."

After spending a few years overseas capturing the culture with her camera, Rozanski came back to the United States and returned to RIT to study graphic design and get a master's degree in Deaf Education.

She has worked as an ASL substitute teacher at a few public schools and a deaf school in Rochester. Recently, she has been teaching ASL classes at the university level.

She said learning ASL is a lot like learning a foreign language, such

as Spanish. It helps you be a better communicator with others and learn more about that particular culture.

"Deaf people can't hear words. They will not understand what someone is talking about, and they can misunderstand," Rozanski said.

ASL is a visual language. It has a lot facial expressions with questions, feelings and emotions.

"Once someone takes an ASL class, then they will understand," she said.

Besides being a teacher, Rozanski is also a full-time mother with two daughters.

"They are hearing and they know sign language through me. They learned ASL when they were babies," she said.

Whether or not someone chooses to learn sign language, the one thing Rozanski wants people to know is deaf people are the same as everyone else.

"Don't be afraid of deaf people. We are normal human beings," she said.

ASL will be offered again at RichmondCC with the start of the 2022 Spring Semester. It can be taken as part of a college degree program or as a continuing education class. Registration for spring classes, including ASL, is now open at RichmondCC. Call Student Services at (910) 410-1700 or visit the Hamlet or Scotland County Campus to sign up.

“I took my studies very seriously,” Thompson said. “If you apply yourself, you can really succeed in this world, and others will notice that.”

A native of Richmond County and a graduate of Richmond Senior High School, Thompson was 29 years old when he enrolled at RichmondCC in 1995 when it operated on a quarterly system.

“I was scared to death,” he said. “I only committed myself to finishing the first quarter, and after that, I was going to quit because I didn’t think I could handle the work flow.”

Thompson was working full time at Industrial Sheet Metal and Mechanical Inc. when he started college, but he eventually scaled his work hours back. After graduating from RichmondCC, he

transferred to the University of North Carolina at Charlotte and earned a Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering Technology in 2000. By working when he was home on holiday breaks, he maintained his position with the company in Rockingham, which had been bought out by Trane Corporation to become ISM/Trane.

When Thompson first started college, he only planned on getting an associate degree, something that would help him get promoted to a supervisory role or something in quality control.

“My initial goal was not really an engineering role. I didn’t think I was cut out for that, but once I started school, I learned that I was capable of getting a bachelor’s degree and conducting engineering work,” he said.

At ISM/Trane, Thompson eventually became a staff engineer/field services manager. In 2005,

Thompson was hired by Railroad Friction to be a manufacturing engineering manager. In his current position as operations support manager, he manages all capital projects, such as installing new equipment, upgrading existing equipment and making improvements to production processes.

Thompson has come a long way from the young man who was only going to take “a quarter” of college classes.

“If you apply yourself, you can do more than you realize,” he said. “If you are inclined to go to college, RichmondCC can certainly benefit your life, like it did mine.”

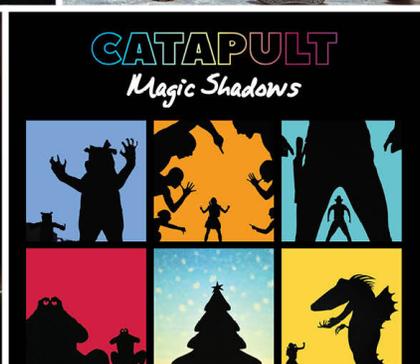
