For the unclassified license, it shall be the qualifier who has passed the building examination. The 8-hour course requirements includes mandatory 2-hour course produced by the Board with information about changes in the laws and rules and other content applicable to general contracting. The remaining six hours will be elective courses produced by outside providers, submitted to and approved by the board.

- Hold a valid North Carolina Driver's license with no limiting restrictions.
- Be able to read and speak English well enough to take instructions from highway signs, to converse with officials and complete the required reports.
- Have a high school diploma or equivalent. If you do not have a high school diploma or equivalent, you will need to take the Reading test and score of 240 or higher.
- Pass a DOT physical and/or hold a valid (12-month minimum) DOT medical card.
- Complete and pass a DOT drug screen.
- Show proof of permanent residency. All immigrants must have proper paperwork.
- Provide a current driving record.

Due to the STRICT REQUIREMENTS of most trucking companies, you must also have:

- A current Motor Vehicle Record with no convictions in the past three years of DUI, refusal to take a chemical test, hit and run, leaving the scene of an accident, careless and reckless driving, a preventable accident or speeding 15 mph over the limit.
- No felony or major misdemeanor convictions in the past five years, based on completion of sentence.

Nursing Assistant I

This is a 160 contact hour course offered in a **traditional** classroom setting training program which is used to prepare an individual to successfully complete a NC State approved competency evaluation examination that allows the nurse aide to be listed on the NC Nurse Aide I Registry. Teaching is provided through instructor lectures, videos, role playing methods and hands-on learning. Upon successful completion of the course, the student will be able to take the state exam through Credentia for listing and certification with the state of North Carolina.

The **Nursing Assistant I HYBRID** class is offered with online instruction as well as hands on learning done in the classroom/lab and clinical settings. Course work is done primarily online with the hands on learning portion. Upon successful completion of the course, the student will be able to take the state exam through Credentia for listing and certification with the state of North Carolina.

Prerequisite: Complete the RCC Tabe Test and score 576 or higher for TRADITIONAL or 750 or higher for HYBRID; prior to admission into the program, you must have a current Tuberculin Skin Test, current Flu shot, up to date Immunization records, and completed current physical from a physician; submit a valid state picture ID and valid US government-issued Social Security card. A high school diploma or GED is not a requirement for admittance into the program. Please bring all required documents with you for registration.

Nursing Assistant Refresher Course

This course is designed to allow nurse asides with expired certification to regain their certification in order to work as a certified nurse aide in North Carolina. Upon completion of 20 class hours and 25 lab hours, the student will have reviewed basic nursing skills, personal care skills, mental health and social service needs, care of cognitively impaired residents, restorative services and resident rights. They will possess the theoretical knowledge necessary to pass the written/oral examination and be able to demonstrate proficiency in nursing assistant skills. Successful completers will receive a course completion certificate and will be eligible to take the National Nurse Aide Assessment Program (NNAAP) Examination necessary for listing on the North Carolina Nurse Aide I Registry.

Who is qualified to take this course?

Career Readiness & Basic Skills

Welcome to RCC's College and Career Readiness! Our mission is to assist adults to learn and to obtain the knowledge and skills necessary for employment and self-sufficiency, assist adults who are parents to obtain the educational skills necessary to become full partners in the educational development of their children, and assist adults in the completion of a high school education. College and Career Readiness classes provide educational opportunities for adults to improve their reading, writing, mathematics, and communication skills through five major program components – Adult Basic Education (ABE), Adult High School (AHS), Compensatory Education (CED), English as a Second Language (ESL) and High School Equivalency (HSE). In all program areas, students follow individual learning plans designed to help them meet their unique goals. This enables students to learn at their own pace with one-on-one assistance from an instructor as needed.

Admission Requirements

- Adults 18 years of age or older who have not completed high school
- 16 and 17 year olds must submit additional forms before acceptance into any program.
- Completion of an Assessment/Orientation session is required for all students.

Class Locations

- Classes are provided in locations throughout Richmond and Scotland counties.
- Morning, afternoon and evening classes are offered.
- Computer-assisted labs are available.

Fees

- Instruction is provided free of charge to all students in College and Career Readiness classes.
- Books and other study materials are furnished at no cost to the student.
- HiSET is currently \$10/per test X 5 tests: **\$50 total**
- GED is currently \$20 per test X 4 tests: **\$80 total**

Adult Basic Education (ABE)/High School Equivalency (HSE)

ABE classes are open enrollment and self-paced. You work on your own timetable based on your assessment. There are no grades for class assignments. At times, you will work individually on your independent study plan while your instructor acts as a facilitator, offering assistance when you need assistance. At other times, your instructor will lead the class in daily lessons and activities.

Throughout your time in class, there will be periodic assessments to determine your progress. When your goal is reached in reading, math and language skills, you may move to an ABE preparation class or an Adult High School class.

ABE/HSE classes prepare adult students to learn or review basic high school subjects. Classes are offered by RCC both on and off campus. Students are assessed with a practice test, which qualifies them to take the official GED or Hiset test. Students study in five areas – writing skills, social studies, science, reading and mathematics.
