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





HVACR Technician: Learning a Trade Is Key to Good Career with Good Pay

22-year-old found his future in trade skill program at RichmondCC

Former Scotland High football player Dre Rivers knew being an athlete would only take him so far in life. Learning a trade, on the other hand, was his ticket to a good career and a good life.


It is for this reason that Rivers of Hamlet never fully considered a football scholarship to a four-year college or university — long before he tore his ACL in a game.

"There aren't many universities that have trade programs, and I didn't want to go somewhere and earn a degree that would end up being like a mortgage payment to pay for and still not be able to find a job," Rivers said. "I chose to come to Richmond Community College because it gave me the ability to learn a trade that would benefit me in life."

Learning a Trade

At age 22, Rivers has earned multiple credentials from RichmondCC on his career path to becoming an HVACR technician. He earned two certificates in heating and air conditioning in 2016, and then he graduated in 2017 with his Associate in Applied Science in Air Conditioning, Heating and Refrigeration Technology. He also completed two levels of the NCCER Electrical program, earning nationally recognized credentials from the National Center for Construction and Education Research (NCCER). He also completed an NCCER OSHA safety class and earned his EPA-608 Certification for handling refrigerants. "The skills I learned help me be ready for a job and to be able to perform at a high level," said Rivers, who now works for Richmond County Schools.

In fact, Rivers was hired for the HVACR technician position with the school system a month before he graduated with his associate degree. They held the position for him, and he graduated on a Saturday and started

that following Monday.

Rivers also gained experience working in the field while he was in college.

"I started working for Witherspoon Heating and Cooling after my first semester, and they taught me a lot," Rivers said. "There's a big difference between what you do in the field and what you learn in the classroom, but school gave me a head start in learning the trade. It's good to have that schooling, because you'll understand everything so much better than going out there blind with no education in it."

Rivers said it was hard at times to focus on his college studies and work at the same time, but he is thankful that the Witherspoon company was willing to work around his class schedule.

"I would also like to thank my RCC instructors, Marcus X, Bill Frye and Reese Bostic.

They made learning something I didn't know easy," Rivers said. "And they were there when I needed personal advice, which they didn't have to do."

HVACR instructor Bill Frye said Rivers' dedication to honing his skills after school and during summer breaks gave him valuable experience. It also has allowed him to start accumulating the required hours working under the tutelage of a licensed contractor he will need to take a state exam for licensure.

"When Dre has a plan, he sticks to it. In class, he would talk about becoming the manufacturer of the 'best unit ever known to man ... 'The DreMan,'" Frye said. "Don't be surprised someday to look out your window and see a brand new DreMan Unit heating and cooling your home."

Frye said Rivers is the type of student who makes teaching a pleasure, and he is proud of all that he accomplished.

Rivers is a product of both local public school systems, having attended Richmond Senior High up until 11th grade and then finishing out his final year at Scotland High School.

After high school, he started working 12-hour shifts in a plant doing general labor tasks. For Rivers, this was not enough. He wanted a career. He knew he was good with his hands, fixing things and tinkering with motors, so he decided to see what programs RichmondCC had to offer. That's how he landed in the Air Conditioning, Heating and Refrigeration program.

"RCC was close to home, convenient and affordable," said Rivers, who also qualified for financial aid. "RCC prepared me for my career. I am able to live a good life and make decent money. The best choice I made was to come to RCC and learn a trade."

Not Done Yet

Because coming to RichmondCC was such a

Megan Baysek

A dual enrollment student from Rockingham, Megan Baysek has also been accepted to three universities for the fall, including University of North Carolina at Charlotte, UNC-Wilmington and East Carolina University. She says she plans to attend UNC-Wilmington to pursue a bachelor's degree in exercise science, followed by a master's in occupational therapy.

"All of the credits I've earned at RichmondCC will transfer to the schools I'm looking at going to, which is going to really give me a head start on my career and save me a lot of money," said Baysek.

Coleman Berry

A native of Ellerbe, Coleman Berry will be transferring to NC State in the fall to major in food science.

"I hope to one day work in a lab doing research on things like food safety," said Berry, who will transfer from RichmondCC with an Associate in Science degree.

"Richmond Community College really saved me a lot of money allowing me to get all of my core classes out of the way here at a much cheaper cost than attending NC State," said Berry. "Now I can transfer there and only have to pay and focus on the primary classes for my major."

Pariya Clark

Pariya Clark is another student who took advantage of getting all of her core classes out of the way at RichmondCC in order to focus on her primary courses at a four-year school. She's already been accepted to the UNC-Chapel Hill, UNC-Wilmington and UNC-Pembroke. She's transferring with

an Associate in Science degree from RichmondCC with plans of becoming a pediatrician.

"One thing I really liked about starting classes at Richmond Community College was it has shown me what will be expected when I transfer to a university," said Clark.

Jacob Michael

Jacob Michael is transferring quite a distance from Richmond County. This RichmondCC student is taking his associate degree out West to attend Utah State University.

"My family is moving to Oregon in June," he explained. "So I'm glad to be able to already have two years of college behind me going out there, which will provide more opportunities for me already having obtained an associate degree."

Michael said his goal is to get a bachelor's degree in computer science with hopes of developing his own software.

good decision the first time, Rivers has decided to return. He is now enrolled in the Business Administration program and working on a second associate degree.

"I want to learn business in hopes that I can one day open my own business," Rivers said.

He is taking four classes this semester, three of which are online.

"Taking online classes is convenient because you can do it on your own time, but you can't procrastinate and you have to stay focused, otherwise you'll fall behind," Rivers said.

This is sound advice coming from someone who has learned that educating himself is the difference between getting ahead in life or falling behind-

ADULT EDUCATION

It's Never Too Late to Earn Your High School Credentials!

• Adult Basic Education (ABE) & High School Equivalency (HSE)

This is a self-paced program where students work individually on an independent study plan while the instructor acts as a facilitator, offering assistance when needed. When your goal is reached in reading, math and language skills, you may move to an ABE preparation class or an Adult High School class. ABE/HSE classes prepare adult students to learn or review basic high school subjects. Classes are offered by RichmondCC both on and off campus. Students are assessed with a practice test, which qualifies them to take the official GED or HiSET test. Students study in five areas – writing skills, social studies, science, reading and mathematics.

The fully transferable program is similar to RichmondCC's Associate in Arts degree, but it includes required courses in design, drawing, art history and art appreciation.

Because of the growth in our programs, the College hired a new art instructor, Andrew Prieto.

About Prieto

Prieto became actively engaged in making things at a very early age. If he wasn't creating pastel drawings of the sunset

or getting in trouble for drawing clipper ships in church, he was concocting some costume or object and having his mother fabricate it for him. When Prieto realized that he would not make it through school otherwise, he made the commitment to art.

"While taking an art appre-

ciation course at a community college, I began to see art as a career path. That one class led me through my BFA all the way to the School of Visual Arts in New York City, where I earned my master's," Prieto said.

According to Prieto, "art provides freedom to the artist to step outside of expected, societal roles. Artists are granted a certain social privilege to show people how the world is, or how it could be, for better or for worse."

At RichmondCC, Prieto teaches students critical and divergent thinking skills. He said he wants his students to pay closer attention to the details in their environments and in media.

To get to know Prieto better, here's how he answered a couple questions:

1. What are your preferred mediums of creative expression?

Sculpture and Performance.

2. What do you feel your work contributes to society? A different perspective.

3. Who are some of your favorite artists?

I love the American contemporary artist, Mike Kelley, who is unfortunately no longer with us. More recently, I have been thinking about my late professor, Tim Rollins, and how he viewed art as a pathway to education and ultimately, social justice. And from the historical cannon, I like Gustave Courbet and his commitment to describing his place and time, as he saw it, through painting. BOLD move!

STEM Summer Camps

Geospatial Math - June 25 - 28 (Grades: 3-12)

Integrating 3D scanning, visualization, printing, and simulations, we create an immersive and fun learning environment through which students can acquire and practice higher level thinking skills. Students are exposed to the engineering process and have the opportunity to design and print objects in 3D.
